3 Rules

Write the entire time (stamina is important to learning how to fail and get back up).

Quick Write Topics

Music in your heart.

Music and memories dance together: ones that we won't forget, that are important to us and why, ones that bring emotion

Poetry.

Read one. Ask them to respond with their thoughts.

Model text.

Published, yours, or student texts. Anchor for the minilesson or workshop.

Blogs.

Talk, chat, recommend, share, pass.

Experiment writing techniques.

Inspiring Quote

Around the world, from the cave paintings in Lascaux, France, which may be 25,000 years old, to the images left behind by the lost Pueblo cultures of the American Southwest, to the ancient aboriginal art of Australia, the most common pictograph found in rock paintings is the human hand.
